Work flirts come back

It's not unprofessional, says new book

AFTER years lost in the wilderness of political correctness, flirting is making a triumphant comeback to Melbourne workplaces.

Whether it's a flutter of the eyelids, the decision to wear a shorter skirt or a cheeky wink at a prospective employer, Melbourne corporate gurus have declared flirting back as a short cut to success. Lawyer, chartered accountant and business coach Rhondalynn Korolak happily admitted to owing at least some of her corporate success to an ability to win over the opposite sex.

"I like to think of it as using my assets for good, not evil," she said. Ms Korolak, a motivational speaker and author of self-help books including *On the Shoulders of Giants*, said flirting should not be considered unprofessional.

"In business settings I tend to wear a lot of French-cuff shirts," she said.

"I'm not coming across with a lot of cleavage so I find other ways to bring across the femininity, whether it be just winking at someone or smiling or having a bit of a laugh with them. If you and I

were sitting in a waiting room waiting to speak to the CEO of a company, I would have an advantage over you if it's a man simply because I'm a woman."

Melbourne life coach, image consultant, entrepreneur and author Ben Angel said the renaissance of flirting at work was long overdue. ''I think with political correctness we've really gone too far and it has actually damaged our relationships, so it's good to be coming out of that," he said.

In a chapter of his new book, *Sleeping Your Way to the Top in Business*, the 28-year-old teaches flirting as a way to build instant rapport with clients, bosses or coworkers.

But Dr Sara Charlesworth, an RMIT academic specialising in gender equality, said flirting was unprofessional and more likely to hinder careers.

Student protest

VICTORIAN College of the Arts students have declared a week of protest against job cuts and course reforms they say will kill the institution's creative reputation.

The students have joined forces with celebrities, including Julia Zemiro from TV's *Rockwiz*, to condemn University of Melbourne's plans to sack 220 workers and drastically reform course structures with the controversial Melbourne Model.

A series of protests kicked off yesterday, with hundreds of students rallying at the Southbank campus.

Save VCA member Zoe Boesen said a week of spontaneous public performances, large-scale art installations and a "silent symphony" would spring up around the CBD all this week.

"What's going to happen with the introduction of the Melbourne Model in 2011 (is) all of the courses will be more than 50 per cent academic, which means instead of dancers training to be dancers physically and painters learning to paint, they'll be sitting in lecture theatres and writing about it," Ms Boesen said. "That has some pretty dire implications for the quality of artists that are going to graduate from this place."

The week of protest will end on Friday with an 11am march from VCA to Parliament House where MP Heidi Victoria and stage musical writer John-Michael Howson will address the demonstration.
